A Story for All Ages Andrea

In wishing to create this service that explores the full Congregational Covenant of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Fort Myers, I wanted to define better for all of us what Covenant truly is. In the nearly year and a half that I have been at UUCFM, I have found Covenant to be so important in the way I express my faith. Some of the things I've learned about covenant:

It is, in a sense, what Rev Arthur called our Congregational Bill of Rights. It helps us to express what we can expect from each other.

Covenant is a foundation. It helps to define the walls and the structure and the form. It defines the boundaries, the container of how we are in

relationship with each other. It helps us to express the things that we place upon the walls of our home to decorate, to help express who we are, within that structure. It provides the roof that protects us from the rain and the sun and helps preserve that home. Yet there are doors and windows in this structure. The ways in which we can see the world beyond our own walls, so that we may learn more about the people around our home. The ways in which we open the Doors of Community to welcome in all people, to offer the shared safety of our home.

Covenant should be our inspiration to be our best selves, not the policing of each other. Covenants help provide that spark for us, showing us how we can stretch to become our best Selves together.

Covenants are our collective commitments that we make to each other, to help us express our relationship to each other and the rest of the world around us. Our collective commitments are the landscape of how we are together. The words of the covenant are the map to help us find our way

Covenant is the invisible thread that allows us to claim and be claimed by our faith tradition; to be connected to each other; aligned with our vision of Beloved Community, across our differences.

Sermon

Covenant on screen, highlighted first line

Dedicated to freedom, equality, and human dignity we covenant together and commit ourselves to accept our diversities

There's a lot packed into these few lines. So let's try to unpack it in small pieces. What does it mean to be dedicated to freedom, equality, and human dignity?

Dedicated is defined as being devoted to, or having single-minded loyalty or integrity. It means that it is an incredibly important focus. So we place our devoted focus on Freedom- the right to speak, act, or think, or even Be, as one wants, without restraint. On Equality- all people having the right to the same status and opportunities, and, dare I say, Equity would be included in how we view that equality, in that we recognize that not all of us start from the same place, and that there needs to be adjustments to correct imbalances before we can even strive for equality. Fairness versus sameness, but we seek to include all. And a devoted focus on Human Dignity- that each individual possesses an inherent worth and value, with no conditions placed on that. Every single person deserves respect, and is entitled to having that worth and value acknowledged and protected. We covenant together and commit ourselves to accept our diversities- We find our connections and commit to each other, we make promise to each other to seek to be our Best Selves together in our striving for those things that we share devotion for. Understanding that we are a diverse group, made up of people who come from a range of social and ethnic backgrounds, of different genders and sexual orientations, from a variety of economic lifestyles. Accepting that each of us has a different perspective and respecting each perspective.

and seek harmony where there is discord,

We seek to find harmony even when there is discord, meaning we seek to find a pleasant combination of ideas and feelings and emotions, a blending of our diversities, and a cooperative existence together, even when there is disagreement or conflict. We have a very important way of helping us to maintain that here at UUCFM- we have a Respectful Relations Team. This Team is here to coach in the communication process, to promote mutuality and consent. They can offer opportunities for deep listening and restorative processes when conflicts become more heated.

We further agree to share in the continuing work of articulating our beliefs and values

We agree to continue our work by expressing and sharing and speaking about our beliefs and values. That's something that seems to be difficult for UUs. Ours is a faith born on the freedom to worship in whatever way our Spirit calls us to, in whatever way suits our own belief system, in whatever way brings us to the Divine or Source, however we feel we are drawn to find Truth. We're not a faith that believes in proselytizing, and sometimes spending our time with others and expressing what our values are and what our faith means can make us feel like we're proselytizing. But it's part of our job to share the joy we have in this Love based faith that people can be drawn to when all they have had is fear based religion. I've found myself expressing what our values are, what a Unitarian Universalist is, to my bus drivers on occasion. Some have wondered what this building is that they come to that they drop me off at and pick me up from every week, sometimes multiple times a week. When I say that this is a congregation, they understand that this is a religion of sorts, and then they often ask me what does this mean, what do we believe, how do we worship, however they feel comfortable wording these questions. I love being able to explain to people that a UU congregation welcomes everyone, and that means ALL people, regardless of any of those things that tend to divide us, because we accept diversity in all forms. Regardless of what their belief system is, what their faith is, because our whole worship is about Love and Community. I have had wonderful conversations with drivers about the need to center everything that one does in Love, and that that is not an exclusively

Christian concept, not even a Christian concept for many christians these days. One of the reasons I loved when General Assembly voted last year to accept the flower that expresses our principles is that it makes it easy for me to remember, on the fly when I'm not expecting or prepared, what principles I can highlight to the people that are asking me these questions. I can remember JETPIG fairly easily- Justice, Equity, Transformation, Plurality, Independence, Generosity/Gratitude. It truly is a wonderful thing to be able to share those concepts with people, even if they never thought to come to a service, or have no intention of attending a service. It's not about having people come here and join us, although that is a wonderful opportunity if it happens, as it allows us to once again show our Radical Hospitality. It's about letting people know what we stand for, it's about letting people know about the world that we envision and seek to create.

and to devote our time, talent, and resources to whatever the tasks require.

Whatever the tasks require- and that leaves the open ended concept of "the tasks". Not having been here for the writing of this covenant, I cannot speak to what was considered then, but to my thinking, from the perspective of the congregation that is here at this very moment, the tasks are varied. Certainly a primary "task" is worship, what we do here every Sunday as a community, but included in that task of worship is community because community is at the center of who we are. As we look toward the greater community, one "task" may be spreading the word of who we are and that we are here, because we are also an oasis, a sanctuary, from the world that tends to look inhospitable at this moment.

Another important UU "task" is social justice, and with the resources we

have here in this congregation, we do a fair amount of outreach. Many people have written letters, called representatives, worked with other groups, to help change proposed legislation, to help preserve some of the rights of those who are at greatest risk.

We have considered our country to be founded on freedom, as laid out in the Bill of Rights in our Constitution, and today we find ourselves faced with those freedoms being threatened, with our Constitution threatened. Today, as UUs, we find ourselves called to speak up to protect and preserve those freedoms. We saw a wonderful turnout of people from this congregation who attended the last rally to speak out to tell our elected officials to keep their Hands Off the things that we consider important in our society. This Saturday there will be another rally, the No King's rally, to let our elected officials know that we will not stand for the overreaching of power and ignoring constitutional law. We have used our voices to speak out For justice. What a beautiful fulfillment of that "task".

Community Sharing Partners have been a "task" that this Congregation has excelled at. Having dedicated the resources of our offerings during Sunday services has provided a financial donation to a number of sharing partners over the years. Those sharing partners are organizations that offer support and help to many of the marginalized in our greater community.

On a more practical level, another "task" is the maintaining of this beautiful space we have here. Many people over the years have dedicated much time and talent, and resources, to not only keeping the grounds at UUCFM looking beautiful, but also by creating ways in which we can utilize the resources of UUCFM to help support this congregational campus. The very many people who have served as governance here, who have served on various committees, over the many years that this congregation has existed, have absolutely stepped up to spend their time and talent on any of the numerous "tasks" that are required to help to grow and nourish a healthy congregation. And even if you don't step into a role of governance, or are not able to serve on Committees often, you have fulfilled the needs of this congregation by simply being here, whether you're physically here inside this sanctuary or are watching and participating via zoom.

CIW and AFF have served as a beacon of hope for farmworkers as they confront human rights abuses, including systematic wage theft, sexual harassment and health and safety violations.
